Tuesdays on the Terrace

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Every Tuesday, Jun 24 through Aug 26, 5:30–8 pm Museum of Contemporary Art Chicago

Enjoy an evening of free music on the MCA's Anne and John Kern Terrace Garden during our annual summer concert series, now in its 26th year, celebrating artists from Chicago's

internationally renowned music community.

Tuesdays on the Terrace continues to offer an expansive and contemporary look at jazz in Chicago while embracing the city's diverse musical traditions. This year's series highlights a range of Chicago artists working in genres like pop, soul, R&B, and more, alongside a strong foundation of jazz performances. Gates open at 4:30 pm, with performances running from 5:30 to 8:00 pm, including a set break.

4th Floor Exhibitions

Paul Pfeiffer: Prologue to the Story of the Birth of Freedom

May 3-Aug 31, 2025

Paul Pfeiffer: Prologue to the Story of the Birth of Freedom presents 25 years of work from artist Paul Pfeiffer (b. 1966, Honolulu, HI; lives in New York, NY), whose practice interrogates ideas of spectacle and mass culture. By repurposing the tools and systems of media production including editing, staging, and outsourcing—Pfeiffer recontextualizes global celebrities such as pop stars, film actors, and athletes to reveal relationships between audiences and icons. As the artist puts it, "who's using who? Is the image making us, or do we make images?"

Whether through televised broadcasts of sporting events, editorial photographs of cultural icons, or the ecstasy of a soccer stadium, Pfeiffer interrogates the consumption of images and culture. For Pfeiffer, the basketball court, the boxing ring, and the stadium not only serve as platforms for grand spectacles but as sites where the body politic—of a nation, of a community, of society—is imagined, defined, and contested.

Spanning two and a half decades of work, the exhibition features works by Pfeiffer in the MCA Collection, including Fragment of a Crucifixion (After Francis Bacon) (1999) and Self-Portrait as a Fountain (2000), which is part of the D.Daskalopoulos Collection Gift. This exhibition is the MCA's fourth that centrally features Pfeiffer's work, following his career-defining solo show Paul Pfeiffer in 2003, MCA Screen: Paul Pfeiffer in 2018, and Fragments of a Crucifixion in 2019. The accompanying catalogue for this exhibition includes an interview from Fragments of a Crucifixion between Pfeiffer and former MCA Marjorie Susan Curatorial Fellow Chanon Kenji Praepipatmangkol, and features contributions from University of Chicago Professor Emeritus

Tom Gunning, artist Julie Mehretu, and historian Lawrence Chua.

Paul Pfeiffer: Prologue to the Story of the Birth of Freedom is organized by the Museum of Contemporary Art, Los Angeles, and curated by Clara Kim, Chief Curator and Director of Curatorial Affairs, and Paula Kroll, Curatorial Assistant. The MCA presentation is curated by Bana Kattan, former Pamela Alper Associate Curator, with Iris Colburn, Curatorial Associate.

Project and Collections Exhibitions

City in a Garden: Queer Art and Activism in Chicago

Jul 5, 2025–Jan 25, 2026

Sylvia Neil & Daniel Fischel Galleries

City in a Garden: Queer Art and Activism in Chicago is an intergenerational group exhibition that highlights Chicago's essential, yet often underacknowledged, role in the story of queer art and activism. The exhibition examines this history from the mid-1980s, when activists radically mobilized in response to the US government's disastrous handling of the AIDS crisis. In this moment of change, activists reclaimed the historically pejorative epithet "queer" as a liberatory term, encompassing all who purposefully deviate from heteronormative society. Drawn from the MCA's collection and other local collections, City in a Garden follows this paradigm shift in LGBTQ+ history by bringing together work from over 30 artists and collectives working in Chicago from the 1980s to the present.

These artists address queerness through diverse media and methods: documenting clandestine queer spaces in photographs, creating sculptures that challenge normative depictions of gender and sexuality, and exploring queer intimacy through drawings, paintings, and videos. *City in a Garden* also features archival materials related to groups who innovatively combine artistic practices with their activism. The exhibition takes its title from Chicago's official motto, *Urbs in Horto*, which translates to "city in a garden." In the context of this presentation, this motto speaks to the exhibited artists' and activists' utopian visions of a metropolitan sanctuary for people of all races, genders, and sexualities. As queer people continue to fight for their lives and livelihoods under ongoing and renewed political threats, these visions remain as urgent today as ever.

City in a Garden: Queer Art and Activism in Chicago is curated by Jack Schneider, Assistant Curator.

Collection in Conversation with Pablo Helguera

Aug 2, 2025–Jul 5, 202 Stairwell Galleries

The Museum of Contemporary Art Chicago is excited to announce *Collection in Conversation with Pablo Helguera*, a community-informed exhibition running from August 2, 2025, to July 5, 2026, in the MCA's stairwell galleries. For this exhibition, the MCA invited artist and educator Pablo Helguera to draw a selection of works from the museum's permanent collection, inspired by conversations with Chicago artists, writers, activists, and educators.

In the fall of 2024, the MCA invited a group of twenty people with different backgrounds and life experiences to meet and discuss the role of art in moments of uncertainty and possibility. This exhibition, which is curated by Helguera and representatives from the MCA's curatorial and learning teams in response to the group's discussions, will be organized by theme throughout the three floors of the MCA's stairwell galleries, confronting trauma, resistance, complicity, and the power of individuals and movements during unpredictable times. Each floor of the exhibition will be accompanied by the voices of individuals whose unique perspectives from the conversations informed the selection of works. With this exhibition, the MCA experiments with a new mode of presenting its permanent collection—in conversation with the people it is meant to serve.

During his six-decade career, Ruscha has created work spanning painting, drawing, photography, books, and film, revealing an artist whose influence exceeds any one genre or movement. The MCA is deeply grateful that he is among the generous and storied artists who enliven our institution with their work for this auction.
