MCA Chicago Announces Fall 2025 Exhibitions and Programming

CHICAGO— Today the Museum of Contemporary Art Chicago announces its fall 2025 exhibition and programming schedule. The season includes the opening of the Chicago-exclusive, major fourth-floor exhibition <u>Yoko Ono: Music of the Mind</u> as well as notable upcoming events such as the fourth annual <u>Chicago Performs</u> series, a new season of <u>Family Day</u>, the return of <u>Deem Symposium</u>, and a roundtable talk on the current exhibition <u>City in a Garden: Queer Art and Activism in Chicago</u>.

Chicago Performs

The MCA's annual *Chicago Performs* series returns for its fourth season with a four-day festival of poignant live performances by Robyn Mineko Williams & Artists, Red Clay Dance Company, and Helen Lee/Momentum Sensorium. Featuring music by Jamila Woods and choreography by artistic director Vershawn Sanders-Ward, the work is performed by a mixed cast from the Red Clay Dance Company and teens from Black Girls Dance.

Major 4th Floor Exhibitions

Yoko Ono: Music of the Mind

Oct 18, 2025-Feb 22, 2026

The Museum of Contemporary Art Chicago is thrilled to announce *Yoko Ono: Music of the Mind*, opening October 2025. The MCA is the exclusive US venue for this comprehensive solo exhibition dedicated to artist, musician, and activist Yoko Ono (b. 1933, Tokyo, Japan; lives in New York, NY). Traveling from Tate Modern in London, where it enjoyed record attendance, and organized in close collaboration with Ono's studio, this groundbreaking retrospective covers seventy years of Ono's trailblazing career, with over 200 works including participatory instruction pieces and scores, installations, a curated music room, films, music and photography, and archival materials. The exhibition reveals Ono's innovative approach to language, art, and participation that continues to speak to the present moment.

Participation is an important feature of Yoko Ono's vision as an artist, which is why visitors will be able to partake in several interactive, instruction-based artworks throughout *Music of the Mind*. This exhibition underscores Ono's legacy of radical performance and her significant and influential contributions to visual art, including Fluxus and Conceptualism; music; film, and activism. The MCA is proud to welcome this timely exhibition, spotlighting Ono's revelatory art from the last seven decades.

Yoko Ono: Music of the Mind documents the artist's career starting with the mid-1950s, exploring her pivotal role in avant-garde circles in New York, Tokyo, and London, including the development of her "instruction pieces," and the active role she played in the formation of Fluxus, the loose art collective and movement founded in New York in the early 1960s. The exhibition highlights key works from across her decades-long career, including her performance Cut Piece (1964), considered a landmark in performance and feminist art; her collaborations with notable musicians such as John Cage, Ornette Coleman, and her late husband, John Lennon; selected activations of instruction-based art from her influential book Grapefruit (1964); her innovative films of the 1960s and 70s including FLY (1970–71) and her banned Film No.4 (Bottoms) (1966–67) which she created as a "petition for peace;" recent works such as her ongoing Wish Tree installation (1996-present); and public artworks that are emblematic of Ono's commitment to peace activism.

The exhibition features several participatory artworks, such as *Painting to Hammer a Nail* (1961/1966), *Bag Piece* (1964), and *White Chess Set* (1966), among others. Later works like *Add Color (Refugee Boat)* (1960/2016) encourage guests to write their hopes and beliefs on a white boat and its surroundings, while the installation *My Mommy Is Beautiful* (2004) gives the public an opportunity to share thoughts about their relationship to their mothers and motherhood.

Yoko Ono: Music of the Mind was organized by Tate Modern, London, in collaboration with Kunstsammlung Nordrhein-Westfalen, Dusseldorf. It was curated by Juliet Bingham, Curator, International Art, Tate Modern; Patrizia Dander, Head of Curatorial Department, Kunstsammlung Nordrhein-Westfalen; and Andrew de Brún, Assistant Curator, International Art, Tate Modern. The Museum of Contemporary Art Chicago presentation is curated by Jamillah James, Manilow Senior Curator, with Korina Hernandez, Curatorial Assistant, in close collaboration with Studio One.

Project and Collections Exhibitions

Collection in Conversation with Pablo Helguera

Stairwell Galleries Aug 2, 2025–July 5, 2026

The MCA invited artist and educator Pablo Helguera to create the next exhibition focused on its permanent collection. This exhibition, *Collection in Conversation with Pablo Helguera*, is informed by a series of conversations Helguera had with a group of Chicago artists, writers, activists, and educators at the MCA in the fall of 2024 and winter of 2025 around the role of art in moments of uncertainty.

Curated by Helguera and representatives from the MCA's curatorial and learning teams in response to the group's discussions, the exhibition will span all three floors of the museum's iconic stairwell galleries and consider ideas that emerged during Helguera's conversations with participants. Accompanied by the voices of the individuals whose unique perspectives on the present informed the selection of works, *Collection in Conversation with Pablo Helguera* presents well-known works from the collection in an entirely new context—a conversation between Chicagoans reckoning with the present.

Six Scores for Yoko Ono

Experience the musical context of Yoko Ono's early work with performances of five 1960s scores—by Mieko Shiomi, Nam June Paik, Takehisa Kosugi, and George Maciunas—and a new commission by MCA Chanel Fellow, Andrew Hansung Park. The performances track the destruction of a violin, smashing boundaries between everyday sound and music.

The MCA DNA Research Initiative is a multi-year curatorial program, supported by the CHANEL Culture Fund, that invites early-career curators and writers to the museum for interdisciplinary research projects related to the institution's collection. Focused on the intersection of visual art and performance, this initiative surfaces overlooked art historical narratives within the organization's history while foregrounding the cross-disciplinary ethos that has been integral to the museum since its founding in 1967.
